 - 1. We currently offer OSHLOS on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays we will look to expand this to include Tuesdays if possible.
 - 2. We offer Minecraft, Cooking, Chess, Football, Basketball, Meditation, Forest School, Phonics, Netball, Art, Loom bands, Tea Time Treat, Lego, Craft Club, Gymnastics, Dance, Choir, Singing for Enjoyment, Archery, Athletics, Cricket, Calligraphy, Knitting, Phonics, Film Club, Christmas Crafts, Fun and Games, Colouring and Construction throughout the year to different year groups. If there are different clubs that you would like to see us offer then we will have this as an Agenda item at Parent Forum and you can share your ideas with us.
 - 3. We will work hard to make more clubs available to Year 1 and Reception pupils in the Spring and Summer.
 - 4. We have engaged with 2 external providers to widen our range of after school clubs and allow these to be run on more days of the week.
 - 5. We have engaged with Progressive Sports who will be offering holiday clubs at school from December 2024.



celebrate success but would be more than happy to hear more about the type of celebrations and sharing you would prefer to see if you could attend parent forum. .



 - 1. We will return non-uniform prices to £1 from November 2024
 - Our prices for breakfast club and after school club are frozen until April 2028 and we
 offer a discount for siblings. We have reached out to schools who offer similar services
 and will review all prices in January 2025 to ensure we are still offering good value for
 money.
 - 3. We will not increase the cost of after school club until September 2028.
 - 4. We will remove after school charges for working parents who cannot collect children for these specific events.
 - 5. We focus in school on reading and writing. Writing is on our school improvement plan and a big focus. Please do not feel pressure to complete these types of activities at home unless the teacher prompts them. The children work very hard in school and home is where they go to reset and relax. Please see the teacher if your specific worries around these areas continue.
 - 6. Parent contributions to many trips are voluntary and there is a misconception that when parents pay for trips they are supplementing other families. This is **NOT** the case. Has **NEVER** been the case. Will **NEVER** be the case. Therefore many parents who don't contribute as they feel other families are being funded by their money create the unintended consequence of making visits unviable as school cannot fund these visits without some parental support. Visits and enrichment will be on the agenda for the Parent Forum throughout this year and we would love to add your voice to the group to help school improve. Coffee, tea and biscuits are provided!
 - 7. We will think carefully about dismissal and drop off times and work hard to support these to be calmer and more orderly. Parents can support us in this by making sure they keep their children with them at dismissal times and exit the playground promptly.

 - 1. We are constantly reviewing this and hope to be able to offer more sessions in Summer 2025.
 - 2. We have a 60/40% split for most work in school so that 60% of activities are completed in maths and English without being done on iPad or computers. For some students the technology is a massive help and part of the reasonable adaptations made for their additional needs but we take an equitable approach and allow children to use the tools they need to remove barriers and maximise success and progressive learning.
 - 3. We listen to children and try to have clear conversations when things do not go according to plan or people make mistakes. We rarely disbelieve children in school as they are honest and take responsibility for their actions. If you feel your child has not been heard or that they have received a sanction or blame when innocent then we would always support you coming into school to share this with us so we can ensure that matters are dealt with fairly and with kindness.
 - 4. SEESAW is a one stop learning tool and very useful however, if technology is a barrier and you would like a paper reading record then please speak to Mr. Reeves directly and we will see what can be done.
 - 5. We are following up the feedback from the survey and hopefully addressing many of the issues.
 - 6. PE is one of our favourite things at Fairmeadows. 100% of pupils participate in PE lessons and are celebrated for doing so! We encourage students and want the best for them. Occasionally pupils have injuries, SEND needs or other barriers that prevent participation at times but we always try to include these students in lessons where possible.
 - 1. The school timetable does not allow additional playtimes but we do make sure children are active, even in lessons and have multiple 'brain' breaks throughout the day. The children have 2 playtimes in lower school as well as a lunchbreak. The children in KS2 have one breaktime and one lunchbreak. The learning time in school is laid out on the school website at www.fairmeadows.net so you can see how much time your child has at break and in class. (We also have many mini-breaks during the day where children dance and stretch and sing.)
 - 7. We will actively source guitar lessons for Spring 2025.
 - 8. We have applied to Derbyshire for funding to increase our building size to permit us to take 2-year olds from 2025.
 - 9. EYFS will be going to the Snowdome in December and have 2 visits in the summer term.



Premises



 - 1. We moved away from paper as the cost of paper has risen exponentially since Covid, the damage to the environment is massive and we wanted parents to be able to share what they do at home using SEESAW.
 - 2. We have massively reduced the amount of homework we ask pupils to do. We cut it from last year to barely any tasks at all and everything is voluntary with no sanctions for incomplete work. We only praise and reward what is done and will never shame, sanction or berate a child for not completing the activity. Homework should be a positive and shared experience. We have many SNED pupils who find homework impossible and emotionally destabilising, therefore we ask that you read when you can and not much else.
 - 3. It's possible that our approach to less homework means that you are less confident in knowing what the expectations are. Each teacher will send the expectations for their year groups out before half term. We also have a page dedicated to homework on our website www.fairmeadows.net. A great place to find answers to all sorts of questions.
 - 4. We will make sure that feedback on homework is timely as this is a key element to making sure it has an impact.
 - 5. We will set two projects in 2025 to supplement normal activities, these will be optional and a lot of fun!




Staffing

- Amount of supply teachers the school since the start of term.
- Consistency of teaching staff
 - 2. Unfortunately the staff in school are not immune to illness, bereavement, accident, injury or mental health challenges. We value the wellbeing of staff and support them to become well; be cared for; and find their way back into class doing the job they love. No school has the budget to be able to have permanent supply on hand to cover classes, and we are no different. We do always insist on specific supply teachers and try to keep these consistent whenever possible. We also refuse to continue working with supply who do not meet our high standards, or who we feel do not met the needs of our children. We will try to minimise supply in future, this will mean everyone is happy and healthy at school, but unfortunately this is beyond our control. At times, external need can impact staffing. We have 2 teachers on maternity leave at present and they will return in March. This may mean them going into other classes mid-year and having changes in staff. These are unavoidable but will be done with secure transition in mind. Clear communication to parents and children so the changes are not a surprise.

Safeguarding

 - 1. We will increase the frequency of online safety lessons and review our policy.
 - 2. We will ensure that dental care and hygiene is taught in every class throughout school.
 - 3. We already do much work on positive relationships through our Jigsaw and R-Time work which you can find out more about on the school website at www.fairmeadows.net
 - 4. We have a child friendly Anti-Bullying policy and a bullying policy on the website. We stamp out instances of bullying when they arise and work hard with pupils and parents where this is the case to stop it in its tracks. Bullying is not tolerated in school and I am happy to talk to you at Parent Forum about your experience and how this can be improved. Parents MUST always feel that they can raise these issues in school, we work hard to make sure that children do. Approach the teacher if there is an issue, relevant staff and team leaders are shown on the website and in the prospectus if you would like to speak to someone on the leadership team.



SEND

- SEND
- To provide quiet environment for children that require it.
- Make a certain type of fidget toy being allowed.

- 1. We have 50% of the school on our SEND register and 18% of those have an EHCP or will soon. Our outcomes for SEND pupils are in the top 4% of the country and we have bespoke interventions, facilities and resources to support pupils with SEND. We pride ourselves on the excellent work we do but acknowledge we can always do more. Our SENDCO is Mrs Balcon and she is always available to discuss any SEND related issues. We seek to include all, meet the needs of all and find solutions with parents that work both in school and at home. We are passionate about SEND and would love to hear more from you about how we can help meet your child's needs in a way we may not currently be doing. Please reach out to us, we are here to help.
- 2. We already have multiple quiet areas in school and lack space to add more. However, every class has access to a sensory bay/breakout space which children can access. We also have 3 quiet areas where pupils can eat their meals rather than in the dinner hall with the whole school. We have a bespoke sensory room where children can go if overwhelmed and use the library at other times to allow children to regulate if they become distressed. We are currently looking into providing a quiet zone for lunchtimes to support those children who find the playground overwhelming. Please come along to parent forum or approach a member of SLT if you feel that your child does not have access to these spaces and we can discuss what might need to change.
- 3. We have a range of fidget toys, calming caddies and other resources available to children at all times. Please approach us to share the toy in question and I am sure that this will be fine.
- 4. Where there are issues we always communicate quickly with parents, however, if an issue has occurred and staff are unaware then please inform us straightaway and we will work hard to resolve this. EHCPs are multi-faceted and complex, if you feel that in some way the provision is lacking or inappropriate in its current form then Mrs Balcon or Mr Reeves are ALWAYS available to discuss this and make sure that the adaptations in place work for the child, the class, the parents and the school. Please get in touch to share your specific concern.
- 5. We work hard to supplement our basic school funding to ensure that we can provide resources appropriate to the needs of all children. Funding for SEND resources and students is an emotive and contentious issue, one we are well versed in tackling. Please come to Parent Forum or make an appointment with any member of staff to share your concerns around adequate resourcing and we will do all we can to make sure this is addressed promptly.
- 6. We make reasonable adjustments for all children, including seating plans, adult support, modified tasks, ICT accessibility, sensory breaks, calming caddies, dyslexia friendly approaches, autism friendly approaches, break time and lunchtime adaptations, individual behaviour plans/charts, part time timetables, peer support and tailored approaches to

communication. If you feel that your child requires something to be modified or adapted that we are not currently putting in place it is essential that you speak to us as soon as possible so that this can be addressed. Mrs Balcon and I are always on hand to discuss adaptations.

Join the Parent Forum! It is an informal group that comes together each term to discuss school and address many of the issues raised on the survey!


- There's no cost other than a little bit of time and we provide refreshments, a listening ear and as much information as you could possibly ask for!

Did you know?

We have a parent forum group that meets every three weeks to discuss school and to share parental views.

At present only two parents regularly attend but the survey quite clearly shows that many of you have questions to ask or ideas to share.

Why not come along to the forum? It is no great commitment, you can come for one, two or all meetings. No expectations, just a chance to learn, share and help us shape the school.

The survey will drive the agenda for this next year so we really want to see you if you had some dissatisfaction with elements of school or some ideas about how we can improve.

We can't make every day chicken chunk day but we can do our best to help every child, family and parent as much as we can.

If you want to see changes, share your voice with the leaders in school by coming to the next forum.

Our school continues to go from strength to strength here are some things you might have missed in 2024:

- 1. Our school is in the 4th percentile for reading writing and maths outcomes at the end of Year 6, and has been improving for 3 years. That means we are in the top 4% of primary schools in the UK.
- 2. Our school is in the 11th percentile for higher standard in reading, writing and maths outcomes at the end of Year 6. That means we are in top 11% of UK schools for higher standard outcomes.
 - 3. Our SEND pupils do exceptionally well with reading, writing and maths outcomes in the 3rd percentile at the end of Year 6. That means we are in the top 3% of UK schools for SEND outcomes.
 - We are in the bottom 40% of schools for our pupil base deprivation indicator and have twice the national average of EHCPs. We also have
 3.5 times the number of pupils with SEND than the average UK school. Despite these factors our school has been in the top 10% performing primary schools for 4 of the last 5 years.
 - 5. We have an historic deficit which means the school often struggles to employ new staff, purchase necessary resources and fund the support pupils require. Despite this we have a dedicated and wonderful team who find creative solutions to support the pupils and parents at school.
- 6. Our attendance exceeded national in 2024 for the first time in 3 years.
- 7. We have a governor-led pre-school. **Children can come to Fairmeadows from as young as 3** and start their journey with us sooner rather than later.
